
School-Age Bullying Behaviors

This training will familiarize educators with school-age bullying by defining what bullying is, what bullying isn't, three types of bullying, and the main risk factors and causes of school-age bullying behaviors.






CKC 2: Health, Safety, and Nutrition

Get Moving with PALS: Physical Activity Learning Sessions to Keep Children Active in Your Program

PALS is a series of trainings developed by Nemours Children's Health that focus on physical activity for children from birth to 6 years of age. PALS workshops examine eight areas of best practices for physical activity and address the challenges early care and education (ECE) professionals face in supporting active play. Participants consider their practices and environments and then develop action steps to get kids moving! This training workshop is available both inperson or virtually and participants will receive a Lakeshore materials kit to assist with implementation of strategies learned in this session.



Keeping Children Safe: Supervision, Tracking and Follow Through

Keeping children safe is a top priority for all educators. In this training, providers will learn how to describe and apply active supervision strategies and systems to keep children safe and accounted for in their programs. Active Supervision is the most effective strategy for creating a safe environment and preventing injuries in young children. Learn the six strategies, how to set up the program environment to effectively supervise and track children, tools to support transition, and discuss leadership's role in reinforcing active supervision and tracking.

The ASQ has been specifically designed to identify developmental progress and spot potential delays in young children. Screening young children is an effective, efficient way for professionals to monitor a child's development. Help parents celebrate their child's milestones, know what to expect next, and determine whether a follow-up is needed. The ASQ is an essential first step toward identifying children with delays or disorders in the critical early years.

With questionnaire results, professionals can quickly recognize young children at risk for social or emotional difficulties, identify behaviors of concern to caregivers, and identify any need for further assessment.



Communicating with empathy and positive regard can be difficult, especially in an unbiased way. Positive family partnerships are essential when fostering a mutually respectful and trusting relationship. Learn how to use this four-step approach that supports adult composure, empathy, positive intent, problem solving, and reflection to support relationship building with your families when having difficult conversations. This training can support new or existing staff on how to build equal and respectful partnerships with families during new hire onboarding and ongoing professional development. This training can also inform the creation of program development plans for developing equal partnerships amongst families and programs.



Explore how read-alouds support development across the domains and strategies for engaging children in both group and individual reading to support a love of reading. Then learn ways to choose developmentally appropriate and culturally sustaining books in this training for family child care providers.



Town Square: Arts and Materials in Family Child Care

Explore choosing art materials and the art process in this training for family child care providers. Develop an understanding of process art, explore various materials that support drawing, painting, and 3D art, and finally, identify your role in facilitating exploration.





Town Square: Exploring Trauma Informed Care in Practice

The trauma-informed approach is guided by the "Four R's": realize the widespread impact of trauma and understanding potential paths for recovery; recognize the signs and symptoms of trauma in clients, families, staff, and others involved with the system; respond by fully integrating knowledge about trauma into policies, procedures, and practices; and seeks to actively resist re-traumatization (SAHMSA, 2014). This Town Square-created training gives practical ways to utilize the Four R's.



Town Square: Supporting Trauma Survivors and Those Who Care for Them

Explore behavioral manifestations of trauma in children and ways to talk to children and families about trauma/emotionally sensitive experiences in this training for family child care providers. Learn more about Social Influencers Of Health (SIOH), which are the systemic challenges that have a negative impact on medical health for children and their families. Lastly, explore provider wellness with information on recognizing different types of provider stress and ways to improve wellness.





Town Square: Assessment and Observation

Explore the importance of observation and assessment in this virtual training for family childcare providers by defining observation and assessment, then analyze how assessment and observation are utilized. Finally, explore the role of families in assessment.



Town Square: Best Practice for Onboarding in Family Child Care

Create a connection between business practices, program vision and mission in your Family Child Care program while understanding the purpose of staff onboarding. After building knowledge and understanding of staff onboarding key principles, create a plan for taking action.



Town Square: Coaching Staff in Family Child Care Settings

Learn what it means to be a coach to new staff and volunteers in family child care. Develop a coaching process to build relationships and learn how to use the three key steps of Powerful Interactions and feedback to maintain coaching relationships with staff and volunteers in the family child care setting.




